AFTER JESUS' ASCENSION

- After the Gospel of John, there are no more mentions of Philip by name
- According to church tradition, Philip the Disciple may have left Jerusalem as a missionary, working in the areas of Scythia, Syria, and Phrygia, all in Eurasia*
- He may have also had a couple of unmarried daughters, whom he spent the final years of his life within the city of Hierapolis**
- He was likely martyred, though sources disagree on exactly how***
- There is no way to know for sure, however, because anything about Philip's life after Jesus' ascension is from extrabiblical sources, some of which have been contested
